Staffing update

We are pleased to be able to now announce, and congratulate Kylie Goddard on securing the Mahuri permanent teaching position here at Lake Rerewhakaaitu School. This will give us a full complement of staff for our school size. We made the appointment last week but were waiting for the paperwork to be finalised, and her current school to have time to make arrangements before publishing. Some of you may have already met Kylie as she has been working part time at Waikite Valley School and Reporoa Primary. Whaea Kylie will start next term in week 3. We look forward to her joining our school community and know you will all make her welcome.

Our roll and staffing numbers for next year, 2025, should remain the same with three teachers. We are sad to say that Mrs Trumper is leaving us next year and will return to a new permanent position at Ngakuru School, this being her previous school. This is being announced now, as Ngakuru have advertised this in their school newsletter, only the day after Mrs Trumper informed me. I was disappointed that we were not given the time to inform our school community prior, as this gave us no time to inform you. However it is what it is, and other schools make their own decisions. Hopefully this quells all of the rumours and gossip in the community that I have been hearing. Our intentions are always for the best of the school and the person/s involved. People will be informed when they need to be and we have all of our ducks in a row. As I have always said, if you have any questions, please come and ask me.

Teacher shortages in New Zealand are having a severe effect on schools. Some schools are having to split classes or even have students stay home as there are just not enough staff to keep the school open safely. When we advertise 99% of the applicants are overseas teachers and most are not suitable for the position. There are just not enough teachers to fill positions, this is why it takes so long to get someone who will be suitable for the position. We will not just employ anyone as this can lead to problems down the track.

We are extremely lucky to have a great staff who knows and values each and every student. We have developed a culture of "our children", not just my class. We can split classes and know the children are still getting their individualised programme. Mrs Bullock, when she is not covering long term for teachers, is also our reliever and can carry on where the teachers have left off. We are also lucky to have Ms Arnott as our Target Teacher, who works very closely with teachers to accelerate learning for our children. We have brilliant experienced Teacher Aides in Whaea Rora and Whaea Sarah, who support our teachers to allow the children to achieve their potential. So, even though it is difficult to fill positions, we have a fantastic team who can give the children the best possible education.

George the Farmer books

Our school won a set of books from Rabobank about George the Farmer. The books are really interesting and have been enjoyed by Mahuri this week. The topics are quite modern, George the Farmer and the Drone Drama, George the Farmer -Ruby and the Dairy Dilemma

Your children's artwork is now available for viewing in the front office until Friday 20th September. Please ensure order forms are returned to the office by the 20th of September. Spares are available in the office.


Pet day lamb / kids VETPlus offer

Pet Day will be held on Saturday 19th October and Group Day on Friday 25th October - Ngakuru School hosting. Lambs and Calves animals need to be born between


20th July and 25th September.
