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Removing barriers to learning

#### Irlens screening 22nd October

Next Tuesday we have the lovely ladies from Empowered Learning Trust coming to screen for Irlens. The trust coordinates Irlen and Vision Screening to identify students who may be struggling with visual difficulty. Good vision is vital to students being able to access learning. 70% of young people with a learning difficulty will have visual issues of some kind. Sometimes it is unclear whether a child has an issue or not, so we screen all students in year 4, plus any new students in above year groups.

The project involves screening students for Irlen Syndrome and other visual issues, and then referring on those who need it to the optometrist and Irlen Diagnosticians.

Thank you to Empowered Learning for providing this free service for our students.

#### **Staying Safe Online**

As our tamariki spend more time online, it's important parents and whānau help them stay safe. Now is a great time to talk to them about how we use the internet and digital technology.

#### Automatic External Defibrillator

The Automatic External Defibrillator that is situated at the Hall is locked. If you have an emergency where you need to access the machine, dial 111 and they will give you the pass code that will open the cabinet.



There is also a fully automatic

defibrillator available at Trevor & Harriet Hamilton's residence 803 Ashpit Road, around the back side of Lake Rerewhakaaitu. Because this defibrillator is fully automatic no training is required simply turn on and place the pads on the patient, the device takes over.

This defibrillator is registered with St John. The Defibrillator is positioned at the front door under the porch and is in a non-coded box for quick access.

These machines can help to save lives and the St Johns statistics show why we need an AED:

1. Each year more than **2,000 New Zealanders will** suffer a cardiac arrest outside of hospital

2. For **72% of cardiac arrests a bystander** will perform CPR

3. People may show no warnings or prior symptoms and **12% survive** to hospital discharge following a cardiac arrest

4. Use of an AED within 3-5 min of collapse can increase the **chance of survival by up to 44%**

#### Te Whatu Ora Health New Zealand

The Dental team is coming to Lake Rerewhakaaitu School on 24<sup>nd</sup> October for a visit to apply a fluoride varnish to help provide extra protection to your child's teeth.

Fluoride is a mineral that occurs naturally in some water sources. Fluoride helps protect both child and adult teeth by strengthening tooth enamel. Fluoride replaces the minerals lost on the surface of the teeth during early stages of tooth decay.

#### What will we do?

1. Apply a protective coating of fluoride to your child's teeth.
